While researching information for wildlife safety issues I came across a great blog on Discover Vancouver Island (https://www.discovervancouverisland.com/blog/bear-wolf-cougar-safety/). Have a look for some great tips:

- Never come between a mom and her babies
- Never approach them, they need their space
- Do not pack smelly foods
- Use animal-safe garbage and storage bins
- Do not walk at night alone, or in the forest alone without a bear bell
- Always keep dogs on a leash
- Be prepared for an encounter with bears or cougars
- Prepare your bear spray
- If in a group, stick together to seem larger
- Determine three things: the kind of bear, if it has cubs and if it is protecting a food source
- Speak slowly in a calm tone
- Back away slowly, keep an eye on the animal and allow for a clear exit
- Look as large as possible
- Do not run or turn your back
- Maintain eye contact if the animal is watching you

We all want to capture amazing photos but remember that we share the forest and we need to respect the animals and be safe.
