
William John (Bill) Rea

Bill was a Past President and Victoria Camera Club member for 30 years. Bill had an avid interest in photography starting back in his high school days; he joined VCC in 1985.

Bill held a variety of positions on the Board of Directors for VCC, from Outings Chairperson to several stints as Photographers in Action Coordinator, to two terms as President.

He was an avid contributor to Close-Up presenting an ongoing series of articles and cartoons.





In 1997, Leon Berod presented his friend, Bill, with the **Frank Turner Award**.

He later moved up Island to supervise the building of schools for John Neilson Architects.

His next move, with his partner Trudy Schouten (née Nievaart), also a VCC member (1993-98), was to Qualicum Beach to work for CJP Architects. It is noted that Trudy organized VCC slide competitions.

Bill was passionate about photography which he continued for leisure and for the architects as well as resorts like Madrona.

In 1996 he won the Audrey Johnson Award for photography at the Sooke Fine Arts Show.

In 2001, he joined his partner Trudy Nievaart, in Holland. They found many photographic opportunities in their travels throughout Holland, France, Ireland, and Spain, for example.

He also taught the Principles of Photography: "The Art of Seeing" to students at an international school.

Bill passed away in Parksville, where he had lived since 2011, on January 10th.


